"TERUMAH" IN A NUTSHELL ...



The name of the Parshah, "Terumah," means "Offering" and it is found in [Exodus 25:2](#).

The people of [Israel](#) are called upon to contribute thirteen materials—gold, silver and copper; blue-, purple- and red-dyed wool; flax, goat hair, animal skins, wood, olive oil, spices and gems—out of which, [G'd](#) says to [Moses](#), "[They shall make for Me a Sanctuary, and I shall dwell amidst them.](#)"

On the summit of [Mount Sinai](#), Moses is given detailed instructions on [how to construct this dwelling](#) for [G'd](#) so that it could be readily dismantled, transported and reassembled as the people journeyed in the desert.

In the [Sanctuary's inner chamber](#), behind an artistically woven curtain, was the [ark](#) containing the [tablets of the testimony](#) engraved with the [Ten Commandments](#); on the ark's cover stood two winged cherubim hammered out of pure gold. In the outer chamber stood the [seven-branched menorah](#) and the table upon

which the "[showbread](#)" was arranged.

The Sanctuary's three walls were fitted together from 48 upright wooden boards, each of which was overlaid with gold and held up by a pair of silver foundation sockets. The roof was formed of three layers of coverings: (a) tapestries of multicolored wool and linen; (b) a covering made of goat hair; (c) a covering of ram and [tachash](#) skins. Across the front of the Sanctuary was an embroidered screen held up by five posts.

Surrounding the Sanctuary and the copper-plated altar which fronted it was an enclosure of linen hangings, supported by 60 wooden posts with silver hooks and trimmings, and reinforced by copper stakes.

TORAH GEM "Zakher 169"

"Clearly, I thought, Uncle had made a difficult request of Dom Miguel, one that he must have refused. Otherwise, my master would not have made reference to Metatron, the Talmudic angel who records the good deeds of Israel. As for the request to repeat Metatron's name one-hundred and sixty-nine times, that was typical of my uncle; it was the number of times the verb 'zakhar', to remember, appeared in the Old Testament in its various forms.

Whenever my master wanted someone of little experience in philosophy to understand a difficult reading of Torah, he gave them a holy phrase related to the verse in question to repeat this many times. Slowly comprehension would take shape in the subject's mind." (Page 67) While the number 169 appears in this historical fiction, it is rooted in serious Jewish scholarship.

The renowned historian Yosef Hayim Yerushalmi, in his seminal work *Zakhor*, notes that the verbal root of "to remember" appears in the Tanakh exactly 169 times. Linguistically, this count distinguishes the active verb from other nouns sharing the same root. For students of Gematria (Jewish numerology), this frequency is particularly profound. The number 169 is the square of 13 (13 x 13 = 169).

In the Hebrew tradition, 13 is the numerical value of both Echad " - אחד)One/Unity") and Ahava " - אהבה)Love"). By appearing 169 times, the act of remembering is mathematically revealed as the multi-dimensional expansion of both Unity and Love.



Due to her courage and her role in saving the Jews, the story of Purim is named in her honor.

Canadian Jewish students on front line



Shortly after Maya Fuerstenberg arrived on campus for her first year at Dalhousie University in Halifax last fall, she wandered through the Dalhousie Student Union’s society expo, a showcase of student organizations representing a wide range of faiths, cultures and backgrounds. There were Muslim societies, Christian groups, cultural associations of every kind, she said. “But there was no Jewish society.”

“I literally walked every floor looking for one,” she recalled. “There are tens of thousands of students at Dalhousie. There are Jews here. I kept thinking, there has to be something. But there wasn’t.”

Fuerstenberg explained that there is a Jewish Law Students Society at the university, which is specific to graduate students studying law, along with a school-affiliated Hillel and Chabad. None of these organizations held a booth at the expo.

The first-year neuroscience student decided that if a Jewish Society didn’t exist, she would create one.

Within weeks, Fuerstenberg assembled a small team and began the process of founding what would become the Dalhousie Jewish Society (DJS) — a student group designed to provide a welcoming space for Jewish students while also fostering allyship and education among the broader campus community.

“I’ve always been surrounded by a very strong, tight-knit Jewish community,” said Fuerstenberg, who graduated from Toronto’s largest Jewish high school, TanenbaumCHAT. “Coming here, I suddenly realized that for a lot of people, I was the first Jewish person they’d ever met.”

That realization helped shape the mandate of the society. From the outset, DJS was intentionally framed not only as a Jewish space, but as an inclusive one.

“It’s not just for Jewish undergraduates,” she said. “Allyship was really important to me. I wanted people who aren’t Jewish — who maybe grew up in small towns or have never met a Jew — to feel welcome and included.”

The Dalhousie Jewish Society differs from Hillel and Chabad on

campus because it is affiliated with Dalhousie directly—giving Jewish students clear representation on campus, Fuerstenberg explained.

“Because we will be able to use spaces like Dalhousie buildings, our society can be increasingly open to non-Jewish students as well, who are looking to be more educated on Judaism and antisemitism. Also, Chabad and Hillel serve the Jewish community at large, while we aim to focus on Dalhousie students, both Jewish and allies,” she said.

This past December Fuerstenberg organized a menorah lighting in the basement of her residence on the first night of Hanukkah. The majority of attendees were not Jewish, she said.

“The more non-Jews we get, the better,” she said. “Not to convert or pressure anyone — just to invite people in, to let them experience holidays we love and understand what being Jewish actually means.”

The path to formal recognition was not without obstacles. Fuerstenberg said the group encountered administrative delays while working with the student union, particularly around ratification and banking logistics. Still, she said the challenges were expected — and worth pushing through.

“We knew it wasn’t going to be easy,” she said. “But the silent majority has been incredibly supportive. Jews and non-Jews alike have been big allies, which honestly surprised me in the best way.”

Today, the Dalhousie Jewish Society is officially up and running. The group recently held its first booth at the winter society expo last month, and continues to grow its membership. Beyond social and holiday programming, DJS is also focused on combatting antisemitism on campus, acting as a bridge between students and university administration when incidents arise.

“We have a QR code where people can report antisemitic incidents,” Fuerstenberg explained. “We meet with campus security and administrators so students don’t have to navigate that alone.”

For Fuerstenberg, the work is about both vigilance and joy — protecting Jewish students while also celebrating Jewish life openly and proudly.

“It’s Jewish representation, Jewish values, and Jewish celebration,” she said.

It is the Jewish Federation of Edmonton's policy that families and individuals needing a bursary be accommodated if at all possible. Those families that do not have the financial resources to pay full fees will be considered for a bursary.

The 2026 funding will open in the new year.

Barbara was active in the community throughout her life and enjoyed the arts, music, and many crafts, including knitting and quilting, which she continued up until her death. She was also an avid reader, a member of the Jane Austen Society and continued to challenge herself by taking a continuing education class each session.

Barbara was predeceased by her husband, Myer, her parents, and her brother, Allen. She is survived by her daughters, Carol and Deborah, her sister, Greta, her sisters-in-law, Shirley, Lillian, and Jean, and numerous nieces and nephews and their children. She will be greatly missed by all those who knew her, including her kind neighbours and quilting group friends.

Now that I have had a few months to digest my Sar-El experience of February (2013), I wanted to share some of my thoughts with you. As with most other first time volunteers, I was not sure what to expect when I arrived at the airport in Tel Aviv with instructions to meet in front of the "Swarovski booth". Forty-five years ago when I reported for duty with the US Army, it was certainly not at the Swarovski booth!

My first encounter with Sar-El was with coordinator Pamela Lazarus who bore no resemblance to my long-ago drill sergeant. Pamela was clearly in charge, but needed no uniform or bluster to display command presence. It was the first indication that I had that things here would be different. Sar-El and the IDF were profoundly different from the military that I knew. In Sar-El we followed orders because we wanted to and because orders were communicated in a collegial,

outcome-oriented and egalitarian manner; we were all pulling in the same direction with no personal agendas! Soldiers, civilian supervisors and volunteers all knew the stakes - there were no slackers.

I felt at home in Israel even though it was only the second time I had been there. When I went to sleep the first night (on my half inch thick worn out mattress), I was emotionally in my own bed. My barracks mates, whom I had just met, were my family-Jews from around the world with whom I shared common ancestry and common beliefs. I immediately liked them and trusted them-and put up with their snoring as they did with mine. In the morning at flag raising, it was difficult to get out the words of HaTikvah while watching the blue and white Magen David hoisted into the Israeli sky. It's hard to sing while you're all choked up. I'll do better next time-maybe.


