"VAYERA" IN A NUTSHELL ...



The name of the Parshah, "Vayera," means "And He appeared" and it is found in [Genesis 18:1](#).

[G-d reveals Himself](#) to [Abraham](#) three days after the first Jew's [circumcision](#) at [age ninety-nine](#); but Abraham rushes off to prepare a meal for three [guests](#) who appear in the desert heat. One of the three—who are [angels](#) disguised as men—announces that, in exactly one year, the barren Sarah will give birth to a son. Sarah laughs.

[Abraham pleads with G-d](#) to spare the wicked city of [Sodom](#). Two of the three disguised angels arrive in the [doomed city](#), where Abraham's nephew [Lot](#) extends his hospitality to them and protects them from the evil intentions of a Sodomite mob. The two guests reveal that they have come to overturn the place, and to save Lot and his family. Lot's wife [turns into a pillar of salt](#) when she disobeys the command not to look back at the burning city as they flee.

While taking shelter in a cave, Lot's two daughters (believing that they and their father are the only ones left alive in the world) get their father [drunk](#), lie with him and become pregnant. The two sons born from this incident father the nations of Moab and Ammon.

Abraham moves to Gerar, where the Philistine king Abimelech [takes Sarah](#)—who is presented as Abraham's sister—to his palace. In a

dream, [G-d](#) warns Abimelech that he will die unless he returns the woman to her husband. Abraham explains that he feared he would be killed over the beautiful Sarah.

[G-d](#) remembers His promise to Sarah, and gives her and Abraham a son, who is named [Isaac](#) (*Yitzchak*, meaning "will laugh"). Isaac is circumcised at the age of [eight days](#); Abraham is one hundred years old, and Sarah ninety, at their child's birth.

[Hagar](#) and [Ishmael](#) are [banished from Abraham's home](#) and wander in the desert; [G-d](#) hears the cry of the dying lad, and saves his life by showing his mother a well. Abimelech makes a treaty with Abraham at Beersheba, where Abraham gives him [seven sheep](#) as a sign of their truce.

[G-d tests](#) Abraham's devotion by [commanding him to sacrifice Isaac](#) on Mount Moriah (the [Temple Mount](#)) in Jerusalem. Isaac is [bound](#) and placed on the altar, and [Abraham raises the knife](#) to [slaughter his son](#). A voice from heaven calls to stop him; a ram, caught in the undergrowth by its horns, is offered in Isaac's place.

TORAH GEMS

I Have Written for You

"Surely, I have written for you [in the Torah] extremely noble things, with counsel and knowledge." (Proverbs 22:20) Counsel alludes to the principles by which the Torah is interpreted, and knowledge to the intelligence that allows one to arrive at truth through discussion and debate (Alshich). Should a person wonder how he can dedicate his life to Torah study when its words are being taught by fallible mortals, this verse affirms that Hashem has given us a Torah of noble words filled with sound advice and vast knowledge (Metzudos). Many sources associate the word [שְׁלֵשָׁה](#) with [שְׁלֹשִׁים](#) three. Sefer Halkkarim teaches that the essence of our faith may be reduced to three fundamental

principles: (1) the existence of Hashem; (2) the Divine origin of the Torah; and (3) reward and punishment. Meiri lists three categories of mitzvos: (1) Those that relate to character improvement, such as honoring certain classes of people, performing deeds of kindness, and refraining from harming others; (2) actions that instill deeper faith, such as the recital of the Shema, wearing tefillin, and observing the Festivals; and (3) contemplation and visualization that help inculcate a belief in Torah principles.

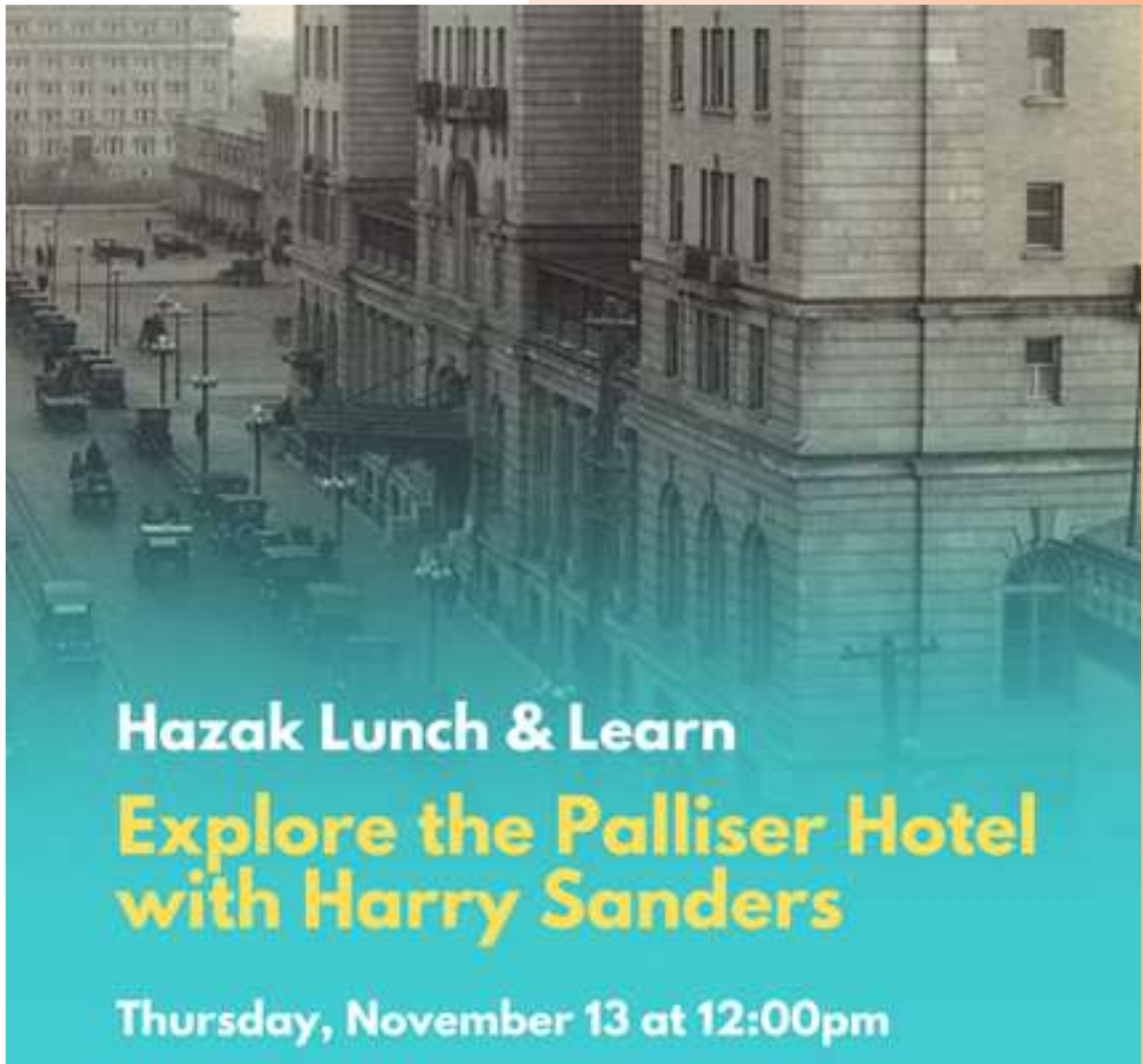

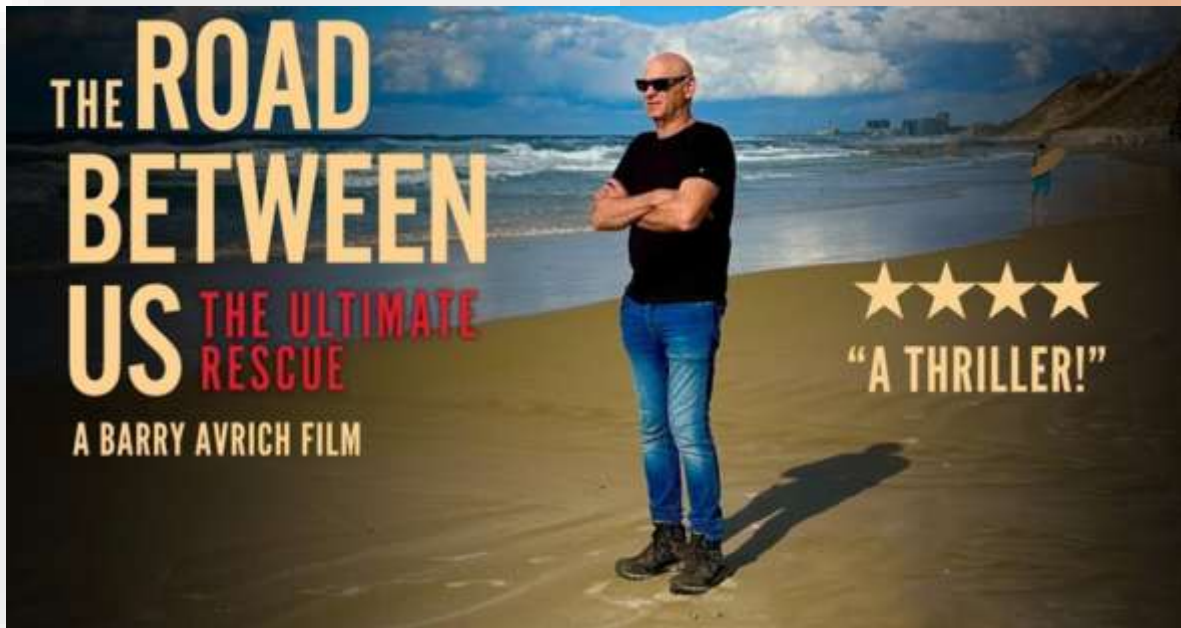

WHAT'S HAPPENING IN CALGARY ...



Calgary Jewish Federation is pleased to partner with the Beth Tzedec Calgary Jewish Film Festival for the screening of *The Road Between Us: The Ultimate Rescue* on Saturday, November 15 at 7:00pm.

Perhaps the most talked about film of this year's Toronto International Film Festival (TIFF), *The Road Between Us* was originally pulled from the TIFF lineup to great controversy, only to be ultimately reinstated, and going on to win TIFF's People's Choice Award for Best Documentary.

The film follows retired Israeli general Noam Tibon, who on October 7, 2023, received a desperate text from his son Amir: Hamas terrorists had stormed Amir's home on a kibbutz near the Gaza border, and he, his wife, and their two young daughters feared for their lives. With no time to spare and relying only on his instincts and military training, Noam sets out from Tel Aviv – 85 kilometres away – together with his wife Gali – navigating ambushes, roadblocks, and a collapsing security system – in a relentless race against time to reach and save their family.

Set against the backdrop of one of Israel's darkest days, and blending intimate firsthand testimony with the raw urgency of a survival thriller, this film is both a gripping cinematic retelling of an extraordinary rescue, and a profoundly human story about courage, family, resilience, and the human capacity for bravery and love in the darkest of moments.

The Rebbe's Shtetl

Confined to the pale of settlement and subject to forced military conscription from the age of seven, the Jews of 19th century Russia were barred from various trades and occupations and subject to countless official and unofficial persecutions. Yet they were allowed, and at times even encouraged, to establish agricultural settlements in certain districts of Southern Russia.

A cache of records recently discovered in St. Petersburg's Russian State Historical Archive detail the founding of one such storied settlement, Schedrin (Щедрин), which lies a little to the south east of Babruysk, Belarus. The discovery was made through the research of Jewish Educational Media, and published in a new volume of the Tzemach Tzedek's correspondence (*Igrot Kodesh Admur Hatzemach Tzedek, Kehot Publication Society 2013*) by Rabbi DovBer Levin, head librarian of the Central Library of Chabad-Lubavitch in New York.

Significantly, the newly unearthed records show that Schedrin was established by Rabbi Menachem Mendel of Lubavitch (1789-1866), the third rebbe of Chabad, who is commonly referred to as "the Tzemach

Tzedek." The finds cast new light on some of the ways that Rabbi Menachem Mendel and other Chabad leaders responded to the problems faced by the Jewish community during these troubled times.

In 1846, records show, Rabbi Menachem Mendel purchased the 17.5 square kilometer estate of Schedrin in 1846. He settled sixty Jewish families on the land, provided them with building materials and other necessary equipment, and ceded them each a rent free agricultural allotment for a period of 25 years. The newly discovered documents also invoke a little known law entitling anyone who settled more than a hundred Jews on their own land to seek Hereditary Honored Citizenship. Accordingly, the Governing Senate of the Russian Empire ultimately nominated Rabbi Menachem Mendel a Hereditary Honored Citizen in 1851.

The female duo of Anna and Angelina Zaval'ska, known as [The Alibi Sisters](#), has been shining in the Ukrainian-Jewish musical scene for five years. Their songs in Yiddish and Ukrainian captivate with charm and melody, reviving a seemingly lost world. The Ukrainian Jewish Encounter presents an exclusive interview — a heart-to-heart conversation with Anna Zaval'ska.

The interview was conducted and edited by Shimon Briman, UJE's liaison in Israel.

Shimon Briman: Was there anything in your childhood that reminded you of your Jewish roots? Communication with relatives, family stories or moments during holidays, or dishes from Jewish cuisine?

Anna Zaval'ska: Even at the everyday level in Ukraine, we partially remain carriers of Jewish culture: songs, names of dishes, and some jargon and slang elements in the language (for example, those that allow you to swear colorfully: "myshyine kopf" — stupid head, etc.).

Challah buns and fish dishes in Ukraine are recognized by all families, it seems, regardless of religion or nationality. They often appear on holiday tables at home.

But my sister and I began to explore the Jewish traditions of celebrations and customs in greater detail during our adulthood, alongside our study of the Ukrainian-Yiddish cultural heritage.

Rudolph Vrba Remembered in Vancouver

Rudolf Vrba, a scientist who had a significant but comparatively quiet career in the laboratories and lecture halls of the University of British Columbia, enjoyed a comfortable life with his wife Robin in Vancouver before his death in 2006. Unbeknownst to thousands of his students over the years, Vrba may have saved more Jews during the Holocaust than any other individual. Despite this astonishing fact, his name has remained almost unknown not only among scholars of that history but even in his own adopted community of Vancouver.

At Schara Tzedek Cemetery in New Westminster on Oct. 26, a monument was unveiled that seeks to remedy Vrba's relative anonymity.

"Why do so few know his name?" asked Dr. Robert Krell, founding president of the Vancouver Holocaust Education Centre and a member of an ad hoc group that came together to recognize Vrba's life and bravery. "Sir Martin Gilbert, the British historian, wrote that Vrba was directly responsible for saving at least 100,000 Jewish lives. Others now credit him with the preservation of as many as 200,000 Hungarian Jews."

Israel Announces Tax Reform for Olim

New Jewish immigrants and citizens moving back to Israel in 2026 will pay no income tax during their first two years in the country, Finance Minister Bezalel Smotrich announced on Thursday.

The tax reform for *olim*, which is part of next year's state budget and was first announced during a ceremony at the Jerusalem headquarters of Nefesh B'Nefesh Thursday, seeks to attract immigrants and returning residents from Western nations amid a global surge of antisemitism.

"This is a Zionist and economic revolution," Smotrich declared, speaking alongside Aliyah and Integration Minister Ofir Sofer.

"Zionism has always relied on three pillars—

settlement, security and aliyah," he added. "These past two years, we invested heavily in security, and the State of Israel is now in a different place. The year 2026 will be a year of revolution in aliyah not as a slogan, but as a practical work plan."

Sofer called immigration "of Zionist, social and economic importance to the State of Israel," emphasizing that aliyah "strengthens our social fabric, brings high-quality human capital and directly contributes to growth, innovation and economic development."

Under the tax reform, new immigrants who make the Jewish state their home and Israelis who return after living abroad for 10 or more years will be charged a zero-percent income tax rate in 2026 and 2027.
