This week's Torah Portion is PINCHAS



The name of the Parshah, "Pinchas," refers to Phineas, who zealously avenged G-d's name, and it is found in Numbers 25:11.

Aaron's grandson Pinchas is rewarded for his act of zealotry in killing the Simeonite prince Zimri and the Midianite princess who was his paramour: G-d grants him a covenant of peace and the priesthood.

A census of the people counts 601,730 men between the ages of twenty and sixty. Moses is instructed on how the Land is to be divided by lottery among the tribes and families of Israel. The five daughters of Tzelafchad petition Mos

es that they be granted the portion of the land

belonging to their father, who died without sons; G-d accepts their claim and incorporates it into the Torah's laws of inheritance.

Moses empowers Joshua to succeed him and lead the people into the Land of Israel.

The Parshah concludes with a detailed list of the daily offerings, and the additional offerings brought on Shabbat, Rosh Chodesh (first of the month), and the festivals of Passover, Shavuot, Rosh Hashanah, Yom Kippur, Sukkot and She mini Atzeret.

TORAH GEMS:

Seek it as Silver

"My child: If you accept my words and treasure my commandments with yourself..." (Proverbs 2:1)

According to the Vilna Gaon , אִמְרוּ 'my words', refers to Torah study, which is obligatory at all times — day and night. Our verse states , תִּקַּח 'accept' this duty constantly. Most other commandments are performed either at specific times — such as matzah at the Seder — or when the opportunity such as returning a lost item. Such mitzvos should be treasured, i.e., safeguarded until they can be fulfilled.

Sfas Emes comments that one should not merely perform commandments, one should treasure them. When a good deed is performed, it should leave a Jew with a treasure, a sense of enhanced attachment to Hashem.

Origin of the name

The word "Ontario" comes from the Iroquois word "kanadario", meaning "sparkling" water. The province is well named, since lakes and rivers make up one-fifth of its area. In 1641, "Ontario" described the land along the north shore of the easternmost part of the Great Lakes. Later, the southern part of the province was referred to as "Old Ontario". The name "Ontario" was adapted for the new era that began in 1867, when the area became a province.

The name "Quebec" comes from the Algonquin word for "narrow passage" or "strait". It was first used to describe the narrowing of the St. Lawrence River near what is now the City of Québec. Quebec has had several names throughout its history: Canada, New France, Lower Canada and Canada East.

Nova Scotia was named by Sir William Alexander, who received a grant to all the land between New England and Newfoundland from King James VI of Scotland (King James I of England) in 1621. The official charter was in Latin and the name "New Scotland" retained its Latin form — Nova Scotia.

Origin of the name

The name "Manitoba" likely comes from the Cree "Man-into-wahpaow", which means "the narrows of the Great Spirit". The words describe Lake Manitoba, which narrows to half a mile at its centre. The waves on the loose surface rocks of its north shore produce curious, bell-like wailing sounds, which the First Nations believed came from a huge drum beaten by the spirit Manitou. The name "Manitoba" was given to the province at its creation in 1870 at the suggestion of Métis leader Louis Riel.

Origin of the name

The southern part of the area now known as British Columbia was called "Columbia", after the Columbia River. The central region was given the name of "New Caledonia" by explorer Simon Fraser. To avoid confusion with Colombia in South America and the island of New Caledonia in the Pacific Ocean, Queen Victoria named the area British Columbia when it became a colony in 1858.

Origin of the name

The province's name was adopted in 1799 to honour Prince Edward, Duke of Kent. He was the fourth son of King George III and the father of Queen Victoria. Prince Edward was commander-in-chief of British North America and was stationed in Halifax when the island was named.

Aboriginal peoples called Prince Edward Island "Abegweit", derived from a Mi'kmaq word loosely translated as "cradled in the waves". Early French settlers called it "Île St-Jean" and when the Treaty of Paris in 1763 gave the island to the British, the name was translated to St. John Island.

The island also has several nicknames including the "Million- Acre-Farm" and the "Garden of the Gulf".

Origin of the name

Alberta was named for Queen Victoria's fourth daughter, Princess Louise Caroline Alberta. The Princess was the wife of the Marquess of Lorne, who was Governor General of Canada in 1882 when the District of Alberta was created as part of the Northwest Territories. In 1905, the name was retained when the District of Alberta was joined with parts of the districts of Athapaska, Assiniboia and Saskatchewan to create the present-day province of Alberta.

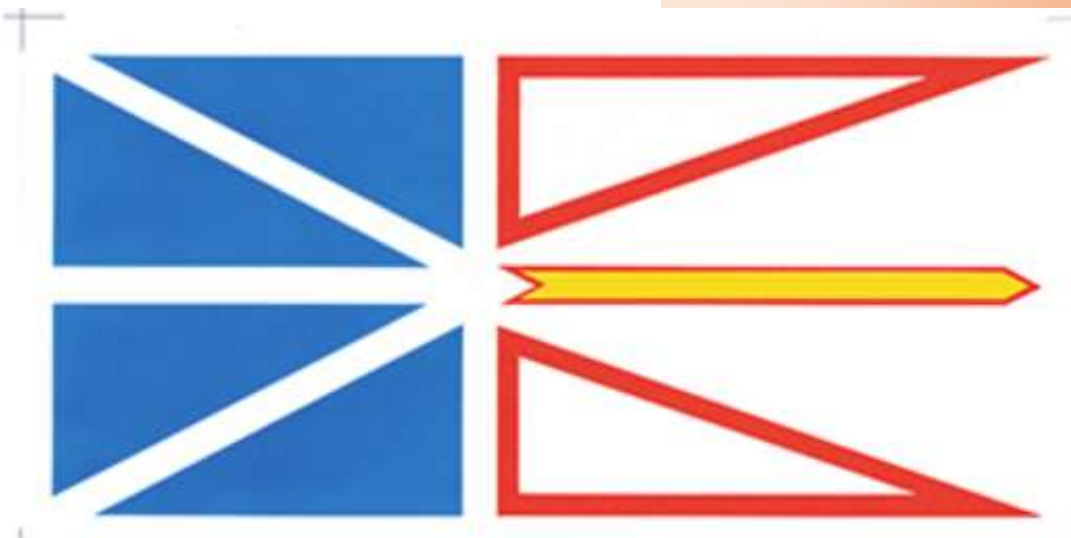

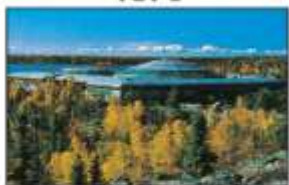

Origin of the name

The territory's name probably comes from the word "Yu-kun-ah" meaning "great river." In 1846, chief trader John Bell of the Hudson's Bay Company canoed down the Porcupine River to where it meets the Yukon River. There, he met natives who told him that the name of the big river was the "youcon". The Yukon River is the fifth longest in North America.
